

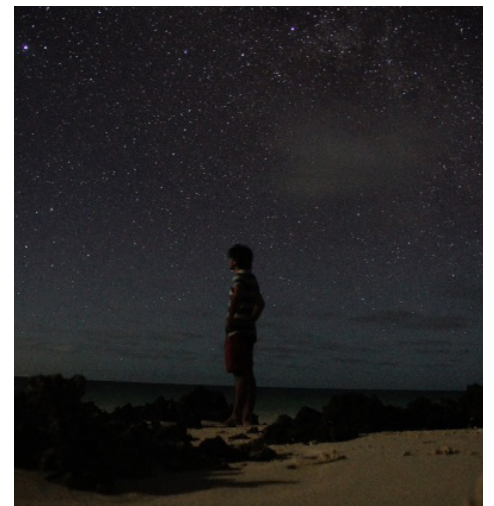

FRESH FROM OUR GARDEN

One of the best and most efficient ways to reduce a company's environmental impact is to try to source as many products as locally as possible. And that's what we've been trying to do for a few years now in Vamizi. Ever wonder where the greens in your salad come from? Since 2007, the Friends of Vamizi Trust has been supporting a growers' association on the mainland in Olumbe, who grow different kinds of vegetables and bring them to the island by dhow on a weekly basis. We also have small kitchen gardens at the Lodge and each of the Private Villas, supplying delicate herbs and salads such as baby rocket, mizuna, radish, basil, mint, parsley and coz lettuce. ■
