Vamizi's Big 5 is a group of endangered marine species who seek refuge in our pristine coral reefs and can often be seen by divers.

Everyone knows Africa's Big Five. But you don't expect to see them on an island like Vamizi. And you won't. On Vamizi, we have our own Big Five. The Green Turtle, the Grey Reef Shark, the Giant Grouper, the Napoleon Wrasse and the Bumphead Parrotfish are all on the IUCN's Red List of endangered species. Their presence in our waters is a very good sign as they play an important role in mantaining a healthy ecosystem. As part of our ongoing species monitoring work, we keep track of their presence in the reefs around Vamizi. And you can help too. We ask every diver to record sightings of

these magnificent creatures using a chart available at the Dive Center. So if you're lucky enough to see the Big 5, be sure to let us know.





ADOPT A GREY REEF SHARK!

n September 2014 we are launching a very exciting project to learn more about Vamizi's famous grey reef sharks. A species on the IUCN Red List and one of the Vamizi Big 5, these magnificent sharks are often seen on Vamizi's reefs and are an important indicator of the health of our marine ecosystem. Freediving World Record Holder and IUCN Oceans Ambassador, William Winram, will be travelling to Vamizi to assist us with a special project to fit satellite tags on 10 grey reef sharks. The data received from these tags will allow us to understand the sharks' movements and breeding habits, providing information which will be invaluable in the bid to protect them. The best part is we are offering Vamizi's loyal followers a chance to be part of this initiative – the first of its kind in East Africa – and adopt a grey reef shark. Packages starting from just \$400 will give sponsors a unique glimpse into the fascinating world of these rare creatures, and even a chance to join William as he dives to fit the tags.
